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
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Museums in Dresden

Dresden is a city of art. Internationally important museums and collections have shaped this reputation over the centuries, as have the Academy of Fine Arts and the work of numerous visual artists.

Two large museum associations form the basis of the state capital's extraordinary museum landscape: the Dresden State Art Collections with their world-famous holdings and historically significant exhibition sites such as the Zwinger and the Residence Palace, and the Museums of the City of Dresden with their predominantly local history-oriented exhibitions that span a wide range, from modern art to 800 years of city history to the Science Centre and Mathematics Adventure Land in the Dresden Technology Collections.

Yet there are also such important museums as the German Hygiene Museum with its exhibitions on man, the body, the environment and society, the Military History Museum with its architectural shell by Daniel Libeskind and the Dresden Transport Museum with its impressive collection of historic vehicles.

But that is by no means all. A multitude of other museums enrich Dresden's cultural offerings as well. Collections of the Technical University present art and science in dialogue, and at the Literaturhaus Dresden you can learn everything about the writer Erich Kästner—who was born and grew up in Dresden—in the 'mobile interactive micromuseum'. The Münchner Platz and Bautzner Strasse memorials preserve and con-

vey memories and history of the unjust justice of 1933 to 1990. The KraftWerk Dresden Energy Museum sheds light on the gas and electricity supply.

Ukrainian Art 1912–2023

Albertinum, Salzgasenflügel

This exhibition is conceived like a journey. It shows individual experiences, personal stories, people and phenomena. They were considered individually, but never in context. Each artist represents a particular microcosm interwoven with the history of Ukraine, its art and its heritage. The exhibition tells many stories about the fluctuating state of the country.

On display are works by contemporary artists that, in dialogue, show the continuity of culture and the sources of contemporary art in Ukraine since its beginnings—from the avant-garde to the present day.

Elegant Encounters

Rosalba Carriera —
Perfection in Pastel

9 June to 24 September 2023
Zwinger, Semperbau

In honour of Rosalba Carriera (1675–1757) as her 350th birthday draws near, the Gemäldegalerie Alte Meister is dedicating a special exhibition to the most famous pastel painter of the 18th century. As one of the first female artists, the portraitist celebrated success throughout Europe. In 1746, a separate pastel cabinet was even set up in the Johanneum near the Frauenkirche and named after her.

The SKD owns the world's largest collection of works by the Venetian artist. More than 100 objects are on display in the exhibition, most of them from the SKD's own collection.

Cornelia Schleime Against the Zeitgeist

For the first time, Cornelia Schleime has a solo exhibition in Dresden. The Städtische Galerie presents an artist whose creative power confidently asserts itself against ideologies and the spirit of the times.

During her studies at the Dresden Academy of Fine Arts, she rebelled against the cultural policies of the GDR. She was refused admission to the then Association of Visual Artists. In 1984 she was expatriated from the GDR and lost her early paintings. With enormous intensity and a refusal to conform, she developed her personal style, which defies classification in any ready-made categories.

Albertinum

New Masters Gallery and Sculpture Collection from 1800



With its innovative concept, the 'Albertinum: Art from the Romantic Period to the Present Day' stands for a fresh start in art presentation in Dresden. It features art from the beginning of the 19th century to the very present, from Caspar David Friedrich to Gerhard Richter. This broad spectrum and the splendid quality of the paintings distinguish the Albertinum and make it one of the most important museums of its kind in Germany. As a museum of modern art in the broadest sense, it offers visitors the experience of Romanticism, Impressionism, Expressionism, New Objectivity and the present. Within this context, contemporary art enters into suspenseful interaction with older works in a collection that looks back on a rich history of its own. In addition to painting and sculpture, the holdings also comprise sound installations and video works. Two large galleries feature a permanent presentation of works by Gerhard Richter, whose archive is likewise in the custody of the Albertinum. The visitor is invited to explore a broad intellectual universe, with the opportunity to perceive various epochs in unaccustomed proximity to one another, and thus to discover them in wholly new and different ways.

The Sculpture Collection encompasses works of more than five millennia, from the ancient cultures to European sculpture of the early Middle Ages and from there to the present. The Albertinum presents works dating from 1800 onward. Older sculptures are on view as part of the Old Masters Picture Gallery in the Semper Building at the Zwinger. For the Sculpture Collection exhibition in the Albertinum, the modern period begins with works by the French sculptor Auguste Rodin. He ushered in the age of modern sculpture and is considered the forefather of a wide range of different styles that crystallized over the course of the twentieth century. The Classical Modern works and post-1945 sculpture shown in the exhibition continue to build on Rodin's basic principle — the subjectivity of art — up to the very present.

The Klingersaal Gallery, designed by the Sculpture Collection and the New Masters Gallery as an epoch room for all the senses, is concerned with the art of the fin de siècle. The Mosaiksaal Gallery is devoted to the major theme of ethics as manifest in Neoclassicist sculpture. The core of the holdings — the antiquity collection — is staged for the visitor in an experimental open depot. On the first floor there are moreover galleries for special exhibitions: changing thematic shows or individual presentations revolving around themes and artists of the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries.

Botanical Garden

Botanical gardens are museums of a special kind: they provide unique insights into the world of living plants and change their face every day. Since 1893, the Dresden garden has been arranged for the most part geographically: The scientific plant collection thus enables botanical world journeys in the smallest of spaces. Around 10,000 plant species from five continents and various climatic zones grow on the open-air grounds and in the three display greenhouses. During a visit there are always new things to discover alongside the familiar. Highlights include a unique collection of annual summer flowers, a collection of pelargonium species and numerous utilitarian plants.

Buchmuseum der SLUB



Book Museum of the Saxon State and University Library

It was in 1935 that the Book Museum first opened in the Japanisches Palais (Japanese Palace), where the Saxon State Library was located at the time. After the building was destroyed in 1945, the library moved to a former barracks in Albertstadt, a district of Dresden. A new book museum was established there in 1952 and remained within that framework until 2002. In 2003, the Saxon State, National and University Library of Dresden (SLUB) moved into its new facilities in Zellescher Weg, which also provides space for exhibitions of different sizes. Alongside the most famous exhibit of all – the Dresden Maya manuscript –, the museum's changing shows feature manuscripts, early prints and valuable bindings, music autographs, maps and photographs.

Dresden Branch of the Archives of the Former East German Secret Police

The archive holds documents from the Ministry of State Security for the former administrative region of Dresden. There are eight kilometres of archived written documents and a great number of images and sound recordings, but also such bizarre reminders of the Stasi's activities as preserving jars containing specimens of the scents of GDR citizens who had been critical of the system. These documents and other items are evidence not only of surveillance and humiliation by the secret police but also of the bravery and civil courage of many people in the GDR. On guided tours of the archive, the filing systems are explained, examples of written documents are shown, and documents in the form of video or sound recordings are played. Interested persons can moreover apply to inspect particular files.

Carl Maria von Weber Museum

A visit to Dresden Hosterwitz offers an opportunity for a good long walk with a musical theme. Not far from the Pillnitzer Schloss (Pillnitz Palace) is the Carl Maria von Weber Museum. The composer and his wife discovered this typical vintner's house while out walking in the spring of 1818. Weber and his family stayed here in the warmer parts of the year in 1818 and 1819 and again in 1822–1824, and many fellow musicians and friends came to visit him here. It was in this house that he wrote his opera Euryanthe, as well as Invitation to the Dance. In the former living room and study, displays of music manuscripts, pictures and texts provide insights into Carl Maria von Weber's creative activity in Dresden. Special exhibitions provide insights into topics of Dresden's music history.

Deutsches Hygiene-Museum

The Human Adventure



The Deutsches Hygiene-Museum is just a stone's throw away from Dresden's Frauenkirche. Founded in 1912, the museum is today conceived as a forum for exhibitions and debates—open to all who are interested in the cultural, social and scientific issues of our time.

The human adventure

The Odol manufacturer and patron Karl August Lingner wanted to educate the people of his time about health in a comprehensive sense. This idea gave rise to the International Hygiene Exhibition in Dresden in 1911—a kind of world exhibition that focussed on people and their bodies and vividly explained medical research. The exhibition was a huge success and the starting signal for the founding of the Hygiene Museum. Today as well, the permanent exhibition is about everything that makes up our humanity: the 'Living and Dying' room, for example, covers everything from the development of a human being to his or her death. Visitors can see the world-famous Glass Woman or experience the limitations of sight and hearing in the age simulator. Other areas deal with nutrition, exercise, the brain, our feelings and our sexuality.

Children's Museum

In the children's museum 'The World of the Senses', numerous experiment stations and games all about our five senses await children aged 5 to 12 years. They are not only fun, but also produce lots of aha effects: Can you hear upside down? What does a shadow look like in colour? Who will win the sound pairs game? And what secrets are concealed in the three caves? Highlights are the mirror cabinet and the tactile tunnel.

Special exhibitions

In large special exhibitions, the museum takes a look at current social topics. 'Of Genes and Human Beings' (11 February to 10 September 2023) asks what impact the findings of genetics have on our ideas of origin, identity, health and nature?

'Hello Happiness' (27 March to 19 November 2023), invites visitors to try out interactive stations and reflect on their own strategies of happiness between crisis management and self-optimization. The video exhibition 'Let's Talk About Mountains' (18 November 2023 to 5 March 2024) is a cinematic approach to North Korea. Forty women and men talk about their personal relationship to the mountain world, which plays a major role in the national and revolutionary myth. With a brief excursus on Saxon mountaineering.

In 1999, the idea generator and architect Ruairi O'Brien designed the 'walk-in treasure chest', a house-within-a-house that links tradition and modernity and combines hands-on museum content with new media technology. Festung Xperience

Splendour. Tears. Disasters. Closer than ever.



After the dramatic flood in 2013, no effort was spared to rebuild the Dresden Fortress. Hidden between the Academy of Fine Arts and the Albertinum an elevator takes you from Brühl's Terrace down to Dresden Fortress. Mighty walls surrounding the 400-year-old brick gate give an idea of the bellicose background of courtly splendor. Where Johann Friedrich Böttger invented European porcelain in his laboratory in 1707 a multi-media experience tour named Festung Xperience is presented now. Over an area of 1,500 square meters, breathtaking 360-degree projections and atmospheric audio technology conveys the eventful history of what was once Germany's most modern bastion fortress.

The gallery is a platform for highlighting the university's teaching collections and current research in the context of contemporary art, as well as presenting the extensive holdings of art made in Dresden from the 1950s to the present. In particular, the Kustodie (Office for Academic Heritage) initiates projects and art science labs at the interfaces of contemporary art, science and research and offers artist residencies as part of the Schaufler Lab@TU Dresden. In the context of these formats, internationally renowned contemporary artists work at TU Dresden to conduct artistic research—in close exchange with the university's scientific community—in virulent contemporary issues and research approaches: from artificial intelligence to smart materials to topics from the environmental sciences.

The permanent exhibition of the Kustodie in the Bürogebäude Zellescher Weg (BZW) shows a cross-section of the university's scientific and technical collections as well as exhibits on the university's history.

The Stasi in Dresden: At an authentic site you can experience what political imprisonment meant in the GDR. On a tour of the only original Stasi prison in Saxony, visitors can see how the state's repressive apparatus tried to eliminate its political opponents. The exhibition and impressive recordings in the former office of the Dresden Stasi chief show the everyday life of the security service. The former Soviet occupation forces used the complex as a prison and court. In the cellar, the barren cells of the Soviet secret service tell of the fates of the prisoners, which often led to the Gulag. This density of historical rooms, combined with interactive exhibitions and eyewitness accounts, is unique in Germany.

Gedenkstätte Münchner Platz Dresden

Münchner Platz Memorial



Ladislav Vojtech was one of over 800 Czechs who were executed in Dresden during the Second World War. The permanent exhibition 'Condemned. Imprisoned. Executed. Political Justice in Dresden 1933–1945 // 1945–1957' tells his story and that of many other victims of judicial crimes committed in Dresden under National Socialism (1933–1945), during the Soviet occupation and in the early GDR (1945–1957) with over 700 photos, drawings, objects and documents.

From 1723 to 1730, Augustus the Strong realized his vision of a baroque Gesamtkunstwerk here as an expression of his wealth and power. After extensive restoration, this treasure chamber, which was badly damaged during the Second World War, has been shining in new splendour since 2006. Kügelgenhaus – Museum der Dresdner Romantik

Museum of Dresden Romanticism

The late 17th-century house named 'Gottesseggen' (God's blessing), also known as the 'Kügelgenhaus', is in the Innere Neustadt. The portraitist and history painter Gerhard von Kügelgen (1772–1820) and his family came to live on the second floor of this house in the late summer of 1808. The Museum of Dresden Romanticism, also called the Kügelgenhaus, has been located here since 1981. In each of nine thematically arranged rooms, a significant phase of Dresden's cultural and intellectual history during the 18th or 19th century is brought to life. To give a representative impression of middle-class social life around 1800, the visitor is introduced to the circle around Christian Gottfried Körner, chief councillor of the consistory at Dresden, as well as the von Kügelgen family and their guests.

Already the building itself is fascinating: known since 1785 as the Hentschel-Mühle (Hentschel Mill), it was purchased in 1879 by Eduard Leonhardi, a pupil of Ludwig Richter. It was converted into a studio for young artists and elaborately painted by Charles Palmié; works by Leonhardi were displayed here from 1885 to the early 1960s. From 1963 onwards the museum was used by different artists' groups for exhibitions, usually of work by young artists. In the 1970s and '80s, with diverse and politically daring exhibitions and a resonance that extended far beyond regional boundaries, a chapter of the history of progressive art was written here. Nowadays the building is a municipal gallery featuring changing exhibitions of contemporary Saxon art and a permanent display of pictures by Leonhardi.

Palitzsch Museum



The permanent exhibition is devoted to the 7,000-year history of Prohlis, the life and work of farmer-astronomer Johann Georg Palitzsch, and the basics of astronomy. In 1758, Palitzsch, a farmer in Prohlis, was the first astronomer worldwide to rediscover Halley's comet, causing a sensation at Europe's academies. The exhibition's main attraction is a digital planetarium (by previous arrangement only) that provides insights into celestial observations, but also takes viewers on a journey to stellar constellations of other ages. Models of the Voyager and Rosetta space probes help describe the study of our solar system and of a comet. With the aid of information plaques on the origins of our worldview, the show links the history of astronomy with space research of the present.

The Porzellansammlung is the most important and, with around 20,000 items, the largest specialized ceramic collection in the world. It owes its existence to Augustus the Strong, who, with some self-irony, described his passion for this costly and fragile material as a 'maladie de porcelaine' — a porcelain sickness. Thanks to an outstanding collection of early Meissen pieces it is possible to trace the development of porcelain at Meissen — from its invention in 1708 to the late 18th century — with the aid of individual works of the highest quality. Equally impressive is the collection of Chinese and Japanese porcelain. Today the finest pieces appear in their full splendour in the magnificent interior of the Zwinger, complemented by a view of the Baroque courtyard.

Armoury — Giants' Hall, Renaissance Wing, Turkish Chamber, Rifle Gallery and Parade Rooms



One of the world's most precious collections of ceremonial weapons and costumes, the Dresden Armoury has its origins in the estates of the Saxon dukes and electoral princes. It unites masterworks by armourers, artists and craftsmen from all over Europe and the Orient and encompasses some 10,000 ceremonial weapons as well as riding gear, ceremonial garments, art objects and portraits, primarily of the 16th to 18th centuries, all once belonging to the Wettin electoral princes.

Some 290 years after its disappearance in 1733, the **Giants' Hall** has reopened in the Dresden Royal Palace, where it now shines in new splendour. It features more than 380 works, among them tournament and ceremonial weapons bearing witness to various historical tournament forms and the magnificence of electoral culture at the Saxon court. Measuring 57 metres in length and 13 in width, the monumental Giants' Hall provides the Armoury plenty of space — not only to display a selection of its most important armour and weapons of the 15th to 17th centuries, but also to stage the objects in a manner that does justice to their onetime use.

In the **Renaissance Wing**, the history of the palace becomes accessible from a new perspective: with the two permanent exhibitions "Electoral Wardrobe" and "On the Way to Electoral Power", visitors can experience the world's largest treasure of magnificent weapons and vestments from the Reformation period and the early Baroque. In the section 'World View and Knowledge around 1600', works from the late Renaissance bear witness to the diversity of the fascinating phenomenon of the Kunstkammer.

The **Turkish Chamber** is one of the oldest and most significant collections of Ottoman art in the world outside Turkey. The Turkish Fashion so popular at the electoral Saxon court finds expression in Oriental and Oriental-style weapons, clothing and riding equipment as well as in the magnificent Turkish tents.

Parade bedroom

The **Rifle Gallery** features a representative selection of around 500 of the most magnificent firearms of the 16th to 18th centuries from the possessions of the Saxon electors. Rifles and pistols from all over Europe are exhibited in chronological-geographical order in 18 built-in showcases, supplemented by ancestral portraits, tournament pictures and antlers, some of them from the original holdings of the Long Aisle.

The **Parade Rooms** were first used on the occasion of the wedding of Elector Friedrich Augustus to the Austrian emperor's daughter, the Archduchess Maria Josepha in September 1719. In this sequence of rooms, the Saxon-Polish elector-king staged his dignity, his power and his claim to rank within the European league of rulers.

After he grew tired of her and banished her, the Elector had the Berg- und Wasserpalais built in the Chinese style and made Pillnitz his Baroque play and pleasure palace. Later, the Saxon court resided here in the summer months and enjoyed the landscape between the Elbe and the vineyards. Today, the enchanting palace park invites hundreds of thousands of guests from all over the world to stroll around. Exotic plants thrive in the palm house and the famous 250-year-old camellia is protected in the winter months by its own mobile glass house. In the Palace Museum, the Catholic Chapel, the Royal Court Kitchen and the imposing domed hall are particularly impressive.

The Natural History Collections Dresden present changing exhibitions on zoology as well as mineralogy and geology in the Japanese Palace. The museum, which has its origins in the Kunstkammer founded by Elector Augustus in 1560, is one of the oldest natural history collections in the world.

The current exhibition 'Moving Earth' shows that the blue planet is always on the move. It is constantly changing its face—and has been for more than 450 billion years! What is so special about the Earth that life has been able to try itself out again and again on it for millions of years? How do volcanism, earthquakes and mountains develop? An audio-visual model of plate tectonics, which regularly causes volcanoes to erupt, illustrates the process. And where did man get his knowledge about the Earth? Rocks and the minerals and fossils they contain are archives of the Earth's history. Scientists can read them like a book.

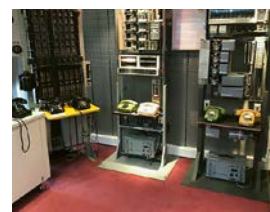
